Weekly Wild Wednesday February 8th, 2023 What a Week of "Wild Wandering"



We have been collecting seeds from MANY sources to Winter Sow a square yard micro prairie right in downtown Siouxland! We mixed all the seeds together, and were going to hand broadcast them when we came up with an accidental and wonderful way to sow those seeds! Any size plant containers will work!



← First, get two containers of exactly the same size and hole distribution. We used both gallon sized and these pint sized containers.

Second. Place the two containers together. one inside the other. \rightarrow





Third, holding the bottom container in one hand, twist or dial the top container with your other hand until the holes are completely shut!

Play with this a little twisting back and forth-- so that you know which direction you want to twist the container when you are ready to sow your seeds.

Fourth, with the holes SHUT. fill the container with seeds -and when you are ready to sow-- twist the container very slightly and gently shake

to distribute your seeds exactly where you would like them to go, at the rate you would like them to fall out of the bottom of the container!

We did take a box with us to catch the seeds and hold the container just in case it started pouring out seeds too fast for our tiny project!



Good Luck!

If you have an area you would like to mix or distribute seeds in a

very controlled manner, give this a try! If you have a great method of your own, please share YOUR successes!



Double dormancy: Seeds need a cold, moist period followed by a warm, moist period followed by a 2nd cold, moist period: Sow seeds outdoors in the fall and expect germination after 2 years. To artificially mimic this stratification process, start by following instructions for code C D for 60-90 days, then store in warm place tabout 80 degrees Filter 50-90 days followed by a 2nd cold, moist period in the

← And our Coral Berry Seeds are back to COLD until Spring! We took them from their warm spot in the house, and shoveled snow on top of them to give them moisture in a very chilly snow pile!

Finger's Crossed! These SHOULD sprout this Spring if we timed everything correctly!! These are a Double Dormancy

cold/warm/cold/warm seed we are trying to trick into sprouting in ONE season, rather than TWO! Click all photo for details!
