Heath Aster

Symphyotrichum ericoides

Attracts: an abundant number of Butterflies, Moths, Native Bees

Host to: Pearl Crescent butterfly

Heath Aster is very easy to grow in medium to dry soils. It is rhizomatous and will self-seed readily, so some may consider it aggressive. It will spread 1+ feet per year. Also called White Heath Aster.
