## Flathers - Wetmore Pioneer Memorial Prairie

When this community was homesteaded in 1867, the land was a sea of grass and wildflowers, a landscape gradually established after the retreat of the glaciers began 14,000 years ago. Rebounding from the Civil War, with faith, intelligence, bravery, grit, and an enormous amount of work, the men and women who settled here made better lives for their families and for the generations following them. The tallgrass prairie became some of the best farm land on earth.

To honor their efforts, remind us of what was here before them, and re-establish a tiny bit of that lost habitat, these eighty acres are being permanently restored as closely as possible to what the original prairie was. The site is dedicated to our ancestors, the tallgrass pioneers.

Seeded with 90 flower species, plus 24 grasses and sedges, beginning in early 2016, it will take several years to regain a true prairie appearance.


Visitors are welcome to walk through it, enjoy the flowers, birds, butterflies, and all the diverse nature of this unique habitat.

### **Prairie History**

Benjamin L. Flathers' daughter, Dolly, wrote about her father coming west from Maquoketa, Iowa:

About April 1st, he in company with his wife's father, Thomas Frazier and family, J.J. Woods, wife and baby (Mrs. O. A. Sadler), Mr. & Mrs. A. Hatfield, and Mr. John Wetmore (H. A. Wetmore's grandfather) and family, started for the new country that was to mean so much to them all. My father drove two teams of oxen, the trip taking about three weeks.

He worked with only the two yoke of oxen for about six years, and broke much of the sod in the community, besides his own. He earned \$3 per acre for the work, and could plow two and one half or three acres a day.

Away from the rivers, the land was all grass and flowers. Only one tree could be seen from the Flathers' home one-half mile north of here. Ben told his grandchildren about clouds of butterflies flying up ahead of the oxen

John Wetmore homesteaded about two and one-half miles south of here. His grandson, Harry (H. A.) Wetmore married Ben Flathers' daughter, Lena.

Owned today by their grandson, Mark Wetmore, the eighty acres being permanently restored to prairie is part of the original Flathers homestead. The project honors all of the Rock Branch community's tallgrass pioneers. Jon Judson, Dedham, Iowa, did the seeding. Lewis Byers, Pierson, Iowa, helps with on-going maintenance.


























Bill and Dotty's "Feed 'N' Seed" was a HUGE success!
