Oh My! Sometimes things get invasive, or too Wild, or just plain scary! We do NOT like to do Fall disturbance without a good reason, and this is one of them! Fall is the perfect time to remove invasive shrubs and trees like:

← Barberry under the grapevine...

Below, White Non-Native Mulberry. Red Mulberry IS Native but we don't have it...Yet...

White Prairie Sage is Native, but it can be a bit aggressive! We have it in several spots INCLUDING as a Native container replacement for Dusty Miller! A friend requested we dry the stems for her, we are learning why


next week! We will harvest the seeds too! Thanks, Marc, for the convenient use of your bucket. We will get it back to you!



Laura came over and she pulled and PULLED the Grapevine OUT of the evergreens!

We carefully crafted the aggressive Native grapevines into wreaths for a fun project you will be seeing in the National Wild Ones Journal NEXT year!

All leaves and debris were left under the evergreens exactly as they fell off the vines. Fingers crossed for the insects trying to overwinter on these leaves!



We carefully placed the stems and seed heads of the White Prairie Sage to dry- separated- in a big cardboard box, and put a fan on low to help them dry. Wow, does THAT room smell GREAT!






Loess Hills Wild Ones and Sioux City Garden Club were selected to decorate one room each next year for the O'Connor House!





