

Many types of plants grow in a pond.

Rooted plants that stick above the water's surface (emergent), like cattails, are the easiest to see. There are also rooted plants that are completely under the water (submergent), as well as free-floating plants like duckweed. There are SO many Native and Non-Native Pond Plants- but there was ONE VERY CLEAR MESSAGE from ALL sources!

Do NOT use a plant that is listed to be invasive! EVER!

Using Water **Features** in Your Garden to Engage Wildlife and Nature floating leaves. Avoid introducing milfoil (could be the invasive Eurasian milfoil), naiad (invasive brittle naiad), curly-leaf pondweed (invasive), cabomba (invasive submersed plant common in water gardens) and coontail (will colonize on its own).

Water Stargrass (S)	Elodea (S)

Growth form: Emergent (E), floating-leaved (F), submersed (S)

\* Is itself an invasive species or closely related

Purchase aquatic plants from a local nursery or one in a climate zone similar to your pond's location. A pond plant identification guide can help you identify the plants growing in your pond so you can properly manage them.

IOWA MASTER NATURALISTS Spring 2024 Course Application Form

The Spring 2024 Iowa Master Naturalists (IMN) basic training course will be hosted by FW Kent Park in Johnson county. Off-site field trips are also scheduled. Most classes meet between 1:00PM-4:00PM on Saturdays beginning on March 16 and continuing through June 1. Classes meet in person, and in person participation is mandatory.
