- Height: 6 inches



Please join the INPS for the First Annual Pasque Flower Hunt on March 16 at <u>10:00-12:00</u>. Meet leader, Tom Rosburg at the Loess Hills Scenic Overlook in Monona County, which

sits atop a ridge. What we will find depends on how early the weather warms the soil where the pasque flowers grow but we think that their appearance will be early this year. If there is time and interest, the pasque flower hunt will be followed by an exploration of Preparation Canyon for woodland spring ephemerals.
