← Dawn worked on this awesome prototype for our local banner for presentations and staging events! We LOVE it!



> We tried her bottom watering method with an old bucket with **GREAT** success!

Tom said it was actually February. He put them in the frig. Wrapped in a damp paper towel and then in a plastic bag.

About 3 weeks ago he planted them in some little plastic bottles with growing medium and then out in the shed (covered).

So this is 3 weeks later and they're forming roots and leaves. But you need to keep them covered for a while.

I move them to the north side of the house so they get shade during the warmest part of the day. I don't open them unless there is algae or the plants are outgrowing the container which is not a problem yet. I also only bottom water with sprouts.


