- ☐ Strawberries, transplant from above, for edges 24
- □ Nodding Onions, transplant from above or your other sources, for edges 24
- □ Bergamot, under the sign 12
- ☐ Little Blue Stem, near lights, maybe need 1
- □ Butterfly Milkweed 6
- ☐ Blazing Star 8-10
- ☐ Showy Goldenrod 6-10
- ☐ Black-eyed Susan 10-12
- ☐ Culver's Root 6
- ☐ Golden Alexander 6
- ☐ Yucca, in front of posts on either side of sign 2
- ☐ Spiderwort, move what is currently in the box
- □ Partridge Pea seeds in the fall
- ☐ Prairie Milkweed, you were going to check with Cheri
- (We did, and Cheri has over 100 seedlings! We only need 12!)

← If we don't have enough from the upper Butterfly gardens, we will use some of the transplants we are babysitting from Dawn's yard!

Those Nodding Onions and Wild Strawberries better grow up quickly!
