
Weekly Wild Wednesday May 29th, 2024 What a Week of "Penstemon and Planting!"

The Chelsea Chop – What Is It, How & When To Do It

If you've ever had flowers that were growing so well in the early to mid-season, only to begin to lean or flop over by mid to late summer, then you may be able to fix them with the Chelsea Chop. I've grown to love this method as it allows me to landscape with certain native plants that can be difficult to grow in formal flower beds.

What is the Chelsea Chop?




Above, Carrie from the Nature Center told us about Native plants at our Gordon Drive Earl May!

And it is Chelsea Flower Show week which signals it is TIME to do the Chelsea Chop on your Native plants that tend to grow TOO wild towards Fall!


