

Learn about starting your own native grass and wildflower seeds on Saturday, February 8 and 10:00 am at the Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center.

This program will review the seed germination requirements for native grasses and wildflowers.

Examples of some of the more difficult seeds to start will be discussed. The presentation will be by Rod Tondreau, Professor of Biology, Western Iowa Tech Biology

Department. The program is co-sponsored by Loess Hills Wild Ones and Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center. The free program is open to the public.

Mark your calendar for our Loess Hills Wild Ones Local Native Plant Sale-The weekend of May 16-18th!

At the 'Wild Mess in Progress', we are propagating Prairie Willow cuttings and fermenting Prairie Rose Hips! For the Rose Hips, harvested at Bill and Dotty's, we soaked the freshly picked hips overnight.

Then we used the highly professional Squish and Stir method to free the seeds!

We soaked those freed seeds for another overnight, and sowed them on VERY DAMP soil.

Half will go into the non-heated

greenhouse to freeze and thaw cycle on their own, while the other half will stay indoors in an indirect light

exposure that stays above 40 degrees.

Wish us luck on the Rose experiments!

and planted them in a
loose soil mix.

Native plants benefit everything, everyone

Native plants mastered drought, heavy rain, diseases, hot and cold weather and more centuries ago. These low maintenance wonders benefit the soil, attract pollinators, stop erosion and bring joy to people and animals who have contact with them.

Master Gardeners from ISU Extension and Outreach, Region 1, are sponsoring a Native Day on Saturday, March 1, to provide a range of information for everyone from town residents to farmers. People can register for one or all four sessions. Attendance is free.

10 a.m. - Native plants - A look at the characteristics of plants native to Iowa and northwest Iowa in particular. Presented by Troy and Sarah Davelaar, Siouxland Prairie Farm.

11 a.m. - Residential landscaping with native plants. Danielle Metzger, Wild Ones - Loess Hills chapter, will talk about designs that especially enhance attracting pollinators and the benefits of doing that.

Noon - Lunch break on own. Local restaurant list will be available. 1 p.m. - Creating or rehabilitating a prairie. Dr. Bill and Dottie Zales, Westfield, and Bev Rutter, Prairie Flower, Spencer, will discuss their ex-

periences in prairie creation and maintenance. 2 p.m. - ISU is a leader in research on integrating prairie strips on farm-

land for conservation and other purposes. Tim Youngquist, ISU agricultural specialist, will speak on the many benefits and how to create strips. In addition to the presentations, literature will be available from a number of organizations that promote prairie plantings. Several organizations will also have representatives present.

This casual event will be in the downstairs meeting rooms of the Extension office at 400 Central Ave. NW, Orange City. Use the east building entrance. This event is free and open to everyone.
