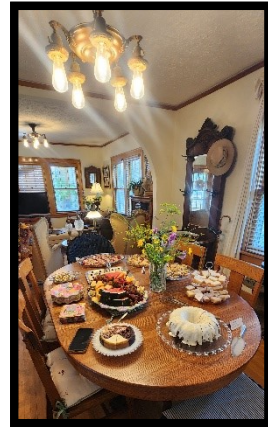


Weekly Wild Wednesday

Live- And artistic dragonflies!



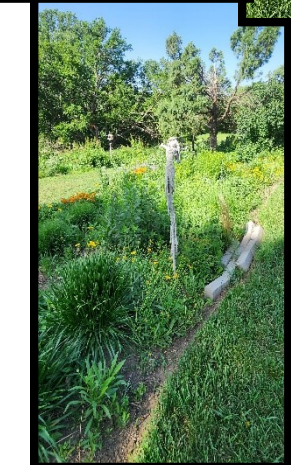
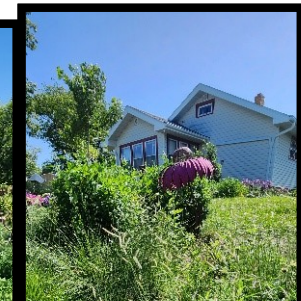
Elderberry in full bloom above...

Mercedes found this awesome beetle at “The Flower House” and the immediate reaction was “I hope this doesn’t destroy my elderberries!” Our immediate reaction was “This Plant is DOING IT”S JOB!!”

We went down a rabbit hole and found out that not only does it show a healthy ecosystem, this is actually the complete OBLIGATE life host plant for this beetle, which is THREATENED on the Endangered Species List!

Grow Elderberry!!!

The elderberry borer is native to eastern North America, ranging from Oklahoma to parts of the southern Appalachian Mountains. [🔗](#)

Habitat:

They are often found in moist areas like wetlands, river edges, and near streams where elderberry shrubs thrive. [🔗](#)

Appearance:

The elderberry borer is a beautiful beetle, characterized by its iridescent bluish wings and a vibrant yellow or yellow-orange band across the upper portion of its wings. [🔗](#)

Life Cycle:

The beetle's life cycle includes an egg stage, where the female lays eggs on elderberry bark and foliage. Larvae hatch and bore into the pithy center of branches, eventually pupating near the roots. [🔗](#)

Not a Major Pest:

The elderberry borer is not considered a major pest, and their presence is often associated with the healthy ecosystems where elderberry grows. [🔗](#)

The Valley Elderberry Longhorn Beetle
(*Desmocerus californicus dimorphus*) relies on elderberry shrubs (**Sambucus spp.**) as its host plant. Specifically, the beetle's life cycle is completely dependent on elderberry for feeding and habitat. [🔗](#)



Here's why elderberry is so important:

- **Obligate Host:** Elderberry is the only known host plant for the Valley Elderberry Longhorn Beetle. This means the beetle cannot survive without it. [🔗](#)
- **Life Cycle Dependency:** The beetle's life cycle stages, including egg laying, larval development, pupation, and adult emergence, all occur within or in association with elderberry shrubs. [🔗](#)
- **Habitat:** The beetle is almost always found on or near elderberry shrubs. [🔗](#)
- **Threatened Species:** The beetle is listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act and is protected because of its dependence on elderberry habitat. [🔗](#)
